Superintendent's Report

Grateful for Partners and Volunteers

Walter ith nearly a million annual visitors and almost 30,000 acres to manage, the Northern Unit staff needs some extra help from partner organizations and volunteers. We are extremely grateful for the projects that our partners were able to complete this past year and the hours donated by our volunteers. Their efforts helped keep the Northern Unit a shining gem in the Wisconsin State Park System. Please see the list below of a few partner projects and volunteer efforts.

Thirteen couples and three individuals served as Campground Hosts at the Long Lake, Mauthe Lake, and Horse Camp campgrounds. They provided 1178 hours conducting light maintenance and sharing forest information.

We also want to express our thanks to some other special volunteers: three Trail Stewards who monitored the Tamarack and Zillmer trails and those who helped with special events including the Work Play Earth Day, Invasive Species Awareness Day, and Smokey Bear's 80th Birthday Bash. In addition we want to thank those who participated in workdays at Lizard Mound State Park and the New Fane Bike Trails.

A big thank you goes out to the Northern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association for the projects the group completed in 2024.

- · Gravel enhancement in the corrals
- Pre and post season cleanup throughout the campground
- Bridle trail extension of a 15-mile Mauthe Lake Loop
- Installation of premier corrals at family camp
- Purchase and installation of 22 fire rings in the family camp
- Donation for a horse wash station in the family camp

We are thankful for the Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic Ski Club for their ongoing trail enhancement and maintenance, consistent topnotch grooming of the Greenbush ski trails, and donation of an overhead door on the grooming shed.

Sheboygan County Cycling Club is a new partner. We appreciate their efforts to clear trees and brush from the trail, bench cut trail tread improvements, all their volunteer workdays, and winter grooming of the Greenbush mountain biking trails.

There is another partner group forming, New Fane Mountain Bike Association, which will work to enhance the mountain biking experience at New Fane. We look forward to working with this group on future projects!

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the Ice Age Trail Alliance's Lakeshore and Washington/Ozaukee chapters for their continued support in maintaining the iconic Ice Age National Scenic Trail throughout the Northern Unit. In September, the Alliance held a trail building weekend that rerouted 4800 feet of the Greenbush Segment near Hwy 23. We also want to send out a special thanks to Kathy Claude and her team for their efforts on invasive species control along the trail this season!

Three Scouting America scouts completed their Eagle Scout Projects for the benefit of the Northern Unit. Myles Jacobi built a new information kiosk at the Forest Headquarters

and Logan Christy built one for the Greenbush Group Camp area. Ben Mittag constructed and installed a new bike wash station at New Fane. We are proud of the work they accomplished! continued on page 2

Board of Directors Update

October 2024 Board Meeting

The Board of Directors had a very full agenda on October 9 at the Ice Age Visitor Center. Below are the highlights of the meeting:

- Negotiations continue between the Friends and the Bureau of Park and Recreation Management on a Concessionaire's Agreement. This will be the first agreement for the Friends.
- Logan Christy, a Scouting America member, shared information about his Eagle Scout project, a new information kiosk at the Greenbush Recreation Area. He asked the Board if the Friends could help pay for some of the materials for his project. The Board awarded him \$600.
- New phone number for the Friends is (920) 313-1566.
- An overview of the process for the Southeast Glacier Plains Master Plan was provided. The plan includes the Northern Unit. A team will be working on this plan through 2025. The board shared two of their priorities for the plan: vegetation/invasive species and education/interpretation.
- The board agreed to support the efforts to create legislation for wake boat regulation. This effort is spearheaded by Wisconsin's Greenfire, which is part of a statewide coalition including the Wis. Conservation Congress, Wis. Wildlife Federation, Lakes at Stake, and others.
- Ice sales at the Mauthe Lake and Long Lake entrance stations were fraught with troubles and did not make as much money as anticipated. After some study, a decision will be made whether to continue the sales in 2025.
- Jackie Scharfenberg reported that the three Dinner and a Show events lost a total of \$860. Overall, the bake sales did well. The deluge

- in June really hindered attendance and the July performer's fee was on the high side. The August event was the best attended and the bake sale sold out. Thanks was expressed for all those who provided bake goods.
- Samantha Lindquist, Forest Superintendent, provided updates on various projects: "How to Use" sign for Kayak Launch, Ice Age Visitor Center Vegetative Rehabilitation, installation of window bird deterrents, funding for the Mauthe Lake fishing pier, Headquarter buildings' new roofs, windows, and overhead doors, and several Eagle Scout projects.

2024 Annual Meeting

The Friends of the Kettle Moraine annual board meeting occurred on Tuesday night, November 12, as part of the Volunteer Appreciation Event held at The Roadhouse in Dundee. Approximately 70 people attended along with three DNR staff members.

President Mike McFadzen conducted the annual meeting. The minutes of the 2023 annual meeting were read and approved along with a review of the 2024 Friends' financials. All board members agreed to serve for another year and two new nominations were received from the floor–Steve Erlbeck and Sharon Schwartz. The membership in attendance voted unanimously to accept the board members as presented.

Evening highlights included a tasty dinner prepared by The Roadhouse, decadent desserts provided by Jackie Scharfenberg, recognition of key volunteers and partner groups, and a fun, informative program, "Neighborhood Owls," presented by Howard Aprill, Wehr Nature Center Naturalist. It was a delightful evening for all who attended. Funds from the Northern Unit helped offset the cost.

Last but not least, we want to express our gratitude and appreciation to the Friends of the Kettle Moraine. They have continued to upgrade their offerings at the Ice Age Visitor Center Gift Shop

and extended their merchandise sales to the two entrance Stations.

They applied and received Knowles/Nelson Stewardship Grants for an accessible bottle filler/drinking fountain, the accessible kayak launch at Mauthe Lake, and the Tamarack Trail improvements. They also cost-shared the installation of Feather Friendly bird deterrents for the Center's windows. We continue to collaborate on the invasive species control efforts throughout the Northern Unit and the new Ice Age Visitor Center Vegetation Rehabilitation project.

With our limited staff and resources, we could not accomplish so much without our amazing volunteers and our dedicated, generous partners. A huge thanks to you all!

Friends Endorse Reasonable Standards for Wake Boats

Current studies show that wake-enhanced boats create a wake three to 12 times greater than a ski boat. Wake boats kick up pollutants from the lakebed into the water column throughout the lake and erode aquatic vegetation. Another huge issue is that wake boats cannot completely empty their ballast tanks, which creates a significant pathway for non-native aquatic invasive species. This lake-to-lake invasive spread worries regulatory agencies and lake users.

Wisconsin's Greenfire, Wisconsin Wildlife Federation, and Lakes at Stake are part of a statewide coalition focused on protecting Wisconsin's lakes. The coalition represents Wisconsin fishing experts/enthusiasts, local units of government, lake property landowners, those concerned with spreading invasive species, and others. These lake enthusiasts are concerned about the devastating impacts of wake-enhanced boating on Wisconsin's lakes and other waterways.

The coalition's reasonable principles include:

• Wake-enhanced boating activities should occur at least 700 feet from any shoreline.

- Wake-enhanced boating activities should occur in water depths of no less than 30 feet.
- Boats moving from lake to lake must have proof of decontaminated ballast tanks before entering lakes to prevent the spread of invasive species.
- Local municipalities' existing right to enact and maintain local ordinances that are more restrictive than these state minimums should be preserved.

The powerboat industry is lobbying hard against these reasonable standards. Join the Friends of the Kettle Moraine by encouraging your conservation or natural resource organization to sign-on in support of these standards, which could potentially become law at the next legislative session.



Master Planning Begins

The Kettle Moraine State Forest-Northern Unit's Master Plan revision/update is in the starting phase. A property plan, also called a master plan, establishes the level and types of public uses, resource management, and facility development that may take place at a property.

Master Planning now happens on a larger landscape level instead of for each individual property in the Wisconsin State Park System. Southeast Glacier Plains Master Plan includes our region of the state and covers the largest, most populus, and likely the most complicated of the State Park System master plans. For many of us, it is the most important because

it affects the future of the Forest we love. Planners will be working on it throughout 2025 with expected completion in 2026. Many interests are vying for a piece of the Northern Unit.
